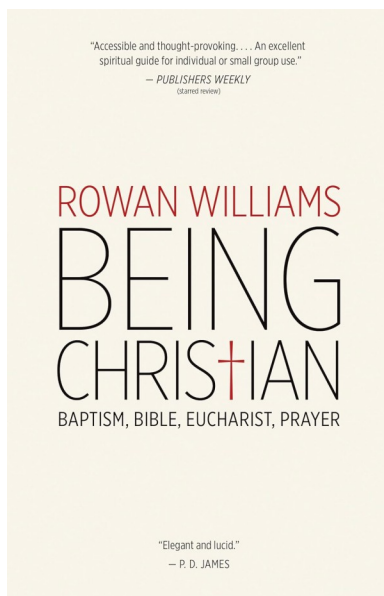

## New Wednesday Evening Study

Our Wednesday Night Study Group begins a new 4-week study using, *“Being Christian: Baptism, Bible, Eucharist, Prayer”* by Rowan Williams, retired Archbishop of Canterbury, on January 8th. During this study we will explore four essential components of Christian life: baptism, Bible, Eucharist, and prayer.

“In accessible, pastoral terms Williams discusses the meaning and practice of baptism, the Bible, the Eucharist, and prayer, inviting readers to really think through the Christian faith and how to live it out.”

The study starts on January 7th and ends January 28th. We will meet in the parish hall at 6:00 p.m. The format for the evening begins with dinner (bring your own) and catching up with each other. Our discussion of that week's reading will start at 6:30 p.m. and closes with an Order for Compline at

approximately 8:00. There will be a sign-up sheet in the Narthex on Sunday, or you can call the office.

### Give it – To Go

*Pray for all poor and neglected people whom it would be easy for us to forget: the homeless and the destitute, the old and the sick, and all who are broken in body or spirit. Turn their sorrow into joy.*

Grant them entrance to the land of light and joy, in the fellowship of the saints; Through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

### Special Days/Events

- ♦ **January 1—Feast of the Holy Name.** The eighth day after his birth, the child was circumcised and given the name of Jesus. The early preachers of the Gospel lay stress on the name as showing that Jesus was a man of flesh and blood, though also the son of God, who died a human death, and who God raised from the dead to be the savior. The name was given to Jesus, as the angel explained to Joseph, because he would “save his people from their sins. The word means” Savior” or “Deliverer” in Hebrew . ## Hospitality Notes: Special Days/Events (Continued)

- ♦ **January 5—Remembering Sarah, Theodora, and Syncletica of Egypt.** “Fix our hearts on You, O God, in pure devotion, that aided by the example of your servants Sarah, Theodora, and Syncletica, the vain pursuits of this world may have no hold upon us, and that by the consuming fire of your Spirit, we may be changed into the image and likeness of your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord; to whom with you and the same Spirit be all honor and glory, now and forever. *Amen.*”
- ♦ **January 6—Epiphany.** *And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.* (Matthew 2:12) “The proof the Epiphany story isn’t in the star, the magi, or the gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. The proof that the story matters is that the magi leave for their own country by another road...In meeting Jesus, the magi are changed. Any fear of Herod’s earthly authority is cast aside, and the comfort of a well-trodden path home is abandoned for a different way. They do not leave as they came; they are changed. Beloved, does your life witness to receiving the unconditional favor of the living God? Do you journey onward by a different road?” (Rev. - ♦ **January 16—National Religious Freedom Day.** The day observes the adoption of Thomas Jefferson's Virginia Statute for Religious Freedom by the Virginia General Assembly on January 16, 1786. The statute became the basis for the Establishment Clause of the First Amendment, and it led to guarantee of religious freedom for everyone in the United States. - ♦ **January 19—Martin Luther King Jr. Day.**
- ♦ **January 26—Conversion of Saint Paul the Apostle.** *I have appeared to you for this purpose, to appoint you to serve and testify to the things in which you have seen me and to those in which I will appear to you.* (Acts 26:16b) “...If there’s a theme I appreciate in Paul’s words, it is that he knows his conversion is not a one-off event...Paul says Jesus told him that he would testify to the things in which the Lord would appear to him. He would keep being converted, day by day, to God’s purposes. Have you undergone conversion? How will you be converted still?” (Rev. David Sibley, *Forward Day by Day*, November | December 2025 | January 2026).
